Recap of July 18th Anchorage Coin Club Board Meeting

The Anchorage Coin Club Board meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM by Club President **Dan Barnhart**. Meeting held at the "Mexico in Alaska" Restaurant in Anchorage.

After a discussion on the results of our club's picnic/membership meeting, an update was given by Treasurer **John Larson** on the club finances. As part of the update, the club's Donation Auction saw \$675 raised. The Board would like to thank all those who donated coins for this auction.

The Board then did a review and evaluation of the club's key cost areas:

- Club newsletter. Adjustments have been made on members who have been delinquent on dues. Now that the club's newsletter is being sent by email to members as well, a cost savings could be realized if members would like their newsletters emailed in lieu of a mailed newsletter. Vice President Jerel Price is working on this matter.
- Shows. Since our coin club qualifies (as a non-profit) for free shows at the Sears Mall, this will be a significant cost savings to the club. Club was averaging \$750 every time we conducted a 3 day weekend show. Mike McKinnon is working on arranging our next show for the month of August with a reduced table fee of \$30/table. This should help the club offset the cost of our monthly trailer storage fees, club liability insurance, and advertising costs for such shows (such as the Fur Rondy shows).
- Use of Central Lutheran Church as our meeting location. Presently the club is paying \$300 per year for use of the church as our meeting location. It is expected to go up slightly next year. Board's view was that we need a place to meet with such costs being reasonable.
- Club's P.O. Box. This costs our club approximately \$280 per year. Board's view is that we need a stable mailing address with such costs acceptable.

The Board then looked at key areas that generate revenue to the club:

- Club Dues. Our club dues have remained fixed for a number of years. Possible club cost savings, email of newsletters, and rising costs is causing the Board to look at revised dues in 2019. One change also discussed was to have members pay their yearly dues effective the beginning of each year.
- How the club conducts the monthly auctions. Of late, the number of donation auction coins (to help out the club) have been few. We have noted a significant number of lots being submitted for both the Live and Silent auctions with no fees charged. Effective our club meeting on September 4th (first Tuesday of September), the Live Auction will see a \$1 fee charged for each lot to both the buyer and the seller. If a coin (or lot) is not sold, the seller to pay the \$1 fee. If the coin is sold, a \$1 buyer fee will be charged to the bid price of the coin (or lot). This should provide the club with either a \$1 or \$2 fee per coin/lot. Donated coins/lots will be taken into account as part of this fee. Silent auction lots are not affected at this time.

Larry Nakata then briefed the Board on the status of the club's 30th Anniversary coins/sets. It was hoped that the coins/sets would be ready in time for our club's Summer picnic. Unfortunately, there were not enough blank planchets available causing a delay. Planchets are on order by the Alaska Mint with the coins/sets delayed by about another week. The bill for the coins/sets will be \$3505.50 which included the cost of the die. We should have all coins/sets ready by the time of our club meeting on August 7th.

Under new business, the Board discussed improved security measures for our monthly club meetings at Central Lutheran Church. Effective our August 7th club meeting, club members are asked to come into the downstairs door (where we hold our club meetings) instead of the main church entrance door (which is supposed to be closed after Church business hours). We will have signs posted on the main door as well as the downstairs door. There should be ample parking by the downstairs door for our club members.




